We were busy as usual demonstrating at shoes and events across the region. Our first event was the new event at the Showground called Springtime live. As usual the stand proved popular with young children enjoying getting hands on with small stone. This was followed by Duncombe Park and on a decent spring day. As usual the same old batch of rough stone was brought out which always gives the team a nice challenge. The Countryside Days educational event was then followed by The Great Yorkshire Show. We had planned to build a curved wall around the back of a toilet block however when the show plans were issued we realised we would be fully hemmed in. Some speedy replanning by Graham led us to building a nice curved seat overlooking the valley. After a rather damp Tuesday the next two days were lovely and the job finished off nicely. Back to Ripley show in August on pleasant day where the team put up the usual section of wall. Whilst the walling isn't challenging there is always a lot of interest in the stand. 2017 YDSWG Secretary's Report

Welcome again to everyone and thanks for coming along, it's great to see everyone again. Thanks to John for the review of the year. John will report on the financial situation Graham will provide an update on our courses

Membership is up on last year at this point, currently standing at record 210 against 199 last year, which is an increase of 11 building on last year's increase of 21 members and has increased now for the 3rd year in a row. This is made up of 14 honorary, 17 life (an increase of 6) and 179 paid members. In total 90 existing members did not renew which is only up 3 from last year. This is unfortunate but to be expected due to the increased number of courses however we did gain over 100 new members through our courses & taster sessions run this year, which again is a record for The Guild. It's always

disappointing when the renewals don't come through however the nature of the courses is people come along to give it a go and that is often enough. It is nice when they maintain the interest and attend events after the courses.

The Guild website is the home of all our information and grows from strength to strength each year. When you Google Dry Stone Walling we come out on the first page near the top which is a brilliant effort by Euan. Many thanks to Euan for all his efforts in maintaining the web site. We are always open to the suggestions from members on how to improve the web site so do please bring them to our attention. We also have a Facebook page which is growing and complimenting the website and has over 470 likes from all around the world, up from 400. It's a great way of pushing information to members (and those interesting in walling) especially reminders about events. If you haven't already signed onto it please do so.

John has covered most of the activity of the year in his report so I would just like to re iterate his thanks to all those who have attended shows and events on behalf of the guild. The days do prove beneficial to the guild in promoting our craft, courses and sometime gaining work for our full time walling members. The venues and events next year will be publicised in the spring newsletter but should be on the website much sooner.

I hope you all enjoyed the booklet newsletter which is now a regular feature of the Guild and a nice way of communicating to all our members. Thanks again to Euan for sorting the production along with all those who contributed to the articles. Also thanks to all those who have advertised in the booklet which has helped make the production commercially viable. If you ever have anything of interest please let us know and we can maybe feature it in next year's issue as it does get harder to think of content every year.

Finally, it takes a lot of time and effort to keep the Guild running so I would like to afford a special thank you to Paula & Graham for the work and time they put into running this organisation. We wouldn't be sitting here today without their unselfish efforts every week of the year so thanks to you both.

Courses Report

By way of review of the 2017 courses year, the tartan number of course places was a record year, with over 100 course places. The demand for courses continues to grow. Also in the past year, new specialist courses, aimed at developing the skills of existing wallers, have been run. These have been run at Fountains Abbey. Six courses were run, covering such topics as arch building, stiles, wall ends and coursing.

In terms of 2018, the plan is to run an extra basic training course, to bring the total up to eight, and a further extra course planned to be on standby, should the demand be there. Additionally, and in line with the feedback from instructors, each course will now be run on a ratio of 4:1, trainees to instructors, to a planned minimum of twelve places, giving a total of three instructors. This, coupled with the extra course will give a

programme of 96 places, possibly 108, if the extra standby course is used. Additionally, there is the scope to grow some courses and to use extra instructors. This has already occurred, with the first course of 2018, and that now stands at sixteen places, already now giving us a total of 100 places, possibly 112.

It is also planned to run a similar number of specialist courses, with up to 24 places.

The instructor numbers have been reduced for 2018, due to one instructor not abiding by the requirement to attend at least two events/meets during 2017. As reported previously, there are efforts to recruit new instructors and to that end two people have been invited to join the instructor body. This will only result in the number recovering to what it was at the start of 2017, so efforts to recruit others will continue.

The annual instructors breakfast meeting will take place in early March 2018, at the usual venue. Instructors are requested to look out for the invite and to make every effort to attend.

2017 Treasurers Report

2016/17 has proved to be yet another good year for the Guild. Membership has increased to just over 200 driven mostly again by the courses we run. We have maintained the expenses paid to instructors and the courses have continued to produce a good source of income for The Guild whilst helping swell the membership numbers.

Overall for the year we have made a profit of £1363. This has probably exceeded the tax constrains we need to work within so may mean a small corporation tax bill. This is unfortunate but unavoidable and ultimately a sign of our success. Here is a summary of the spend for the year

Equipment. We have purchase 2 more flags to promote the Guild at shows and events. We now have 3 in total

Storage. This bill looks high because it actually covers 2 years. This is to securely store all the guild show assets such as gazebos, tables, chairs etc

Refreshments. This for the instructors' breakfast meet. Also, due to the success and strong position we are in the Committee decided to rewards all the instructors and committee members with a thank you meal. A voucher for the black Sheep has been purchased for redemption next year. This is also a valid tax-deductible expense

Expenses have been paid again to cover mileage of the committee on Guild business. These will remain in place as long as The Guild is financially able to support them

Making payments is becoming easier as most are now done by electronic bank transfer. We want to have all instructors on electronic payment next year. With some great work done by Euan & Paula we have moved to the Stripe payment method instead of PayPal. This is much easier to work with and charges less commission than PayPal

To conclude we are financially strong whilst also improving many aspects such as the show kit, instructors' tools and first aid boxes.

Bill Cowling congratulated the Guild on its continued success and ongoing relationship with the YAS & GYS
