Welcome to 2010 with the YDSWG!

To those of you who don't know me let me introduce myself. I am John Pridmore and I was elected as the new Chairman when Michael Booth stepped down at the AGM last November. I have been with the Guild since 2004 and have qualified as both Master Waller and Instructor. I would like to thank Michael for his excellent leadership and hard work over the past 7 years in helping to move the Guild forward as an organisation. He has done a great job for the Guild and I hope I can continue to build on the improvements he has made.

Spring is slowly starting to arrive after a very long and hard winter. Those of you who enjoy a bit of winter walling will have had few opportunities since mid-December, with the stone being either covered in snow or 'welded' to the ground with hard frost. Let's hope that a hard winter heralds a glorious summer.

A warm welcome to all our new members who joined us in 2009. I hope that you are still enthusiastic after the winter period and keen to get out and improve your walling skills. There are numerous events planned for the year which are all highlighted on the website **ydswg.co.uk**, which include practice meets, shows, sponsored builds and our competition. This year we have tried to arrange the practice meets in an effort to cover the geographical spread of our membership. The first meet will be at West Bolton Farm near Carperby on 10th April. We hope you will be able to attend one or more of the practice meets throughout the year and if you are struggling to make it for a full day why not come along for a morning or afternoon. There is no charge and the events offer a great opportunity to brush up your skills, ask advice from experienced wallers and use different types of stone in different environments. The atmosphere is very friendly and open to all, including any non-members who may want to try out Dry Stone Walling as a 'taster'. A reminder will be emailed out prior to each event so if your email details have changed recently please let us know so you don't miss out.



The sponsored build is at West Bolton Farm again this year. Many thanks to all those who attended last year when we repaired four different sections of wall on the farm. The Guild is again most appreciative of Mr and Mrs Langhorne for their generous sponsorship, and the splendid teas laid on afterwards. Again if you are able to attend, even for a few hours, it is appreciated and helps provide vital funds to keep the Guild operating.

We also attend several agricultural shows throughout the year, the first being at Duncombe Park, Helmsley on Monday 31st May. We have again been asked to build a permanent feature at the Great Yorkshire Show this year, (the final design has still to be agreed). At Masham Steam Rally we will be adding to the new section of wall started last year using quarried stone which offers a great opportunity to work with new stone. This is also a permanent feature that will remain once the show has finished.

These shows are open to all members although the complimentary ticket places on our stand are limited. It will also be a great advertisement for the Guild.

Our website has grown and developed into a great tool to promote the Guild and the craft of Dry Stone Walling. Many thanks must go to the site designer Euan Raffel for a very professional job. Thanks are also due to Dave Purvis for a constant supply of new material to keep the site fresh and up to date. Volunteers

- 1. The Guild gets involved in a number of school and educational events organised by the Yorkshire Agricultural Society in an effort to keep our craft alive in young minds. This year we are able to offer expenses at 40p per mile for those willing to give a little of their time to these worthy causes. It is always a lot of fun and very rewarding so do come along. We have offered to demonstrate dry stone walling at Askham Bryan College York during their open day on Sunday 20th June. 2 volunteers living nearby would be very welcome; the aim here is to generate some enthusiasm amongst the visitors that day and promote the Askham Bryan training course at Thirsk in July. Their record at filling the courses we run on their behalf is poor with many cancellations in the past. Again, please get in touch directly with me.

Skills Tests

The Guild has three levels of skills tests for members wishing to have their abilities assessed by wallers with long experience. **All are by pre-arrangement only**.

The **Basic** test can often be taken at one of the Practice meets; it involves pulling down a 2 metre section of wall and rebuilding it under exam conditions to a specified quality level within 7 hours. Successful candidates are issued with a certificate together with a verbal assessment of their work, drawing attention to areas of improvement or any weakness in technique.

The **Advanced** test is to a more stringent quality level; the build includes the construction of a wall head and the candidate is expected to be able to answer question aimed at exploring his/her understanding of the history and knowledge of the craft. Examination will be by a Master waller and there is a fee for the test.

The **Master** test involves the assessment by two Master wallers of past work by the candidate as well as an observed build with a special feature of choice; it is



particularly directed at assessing wallers aiming at the Professional level to ensure a satisfactory and consistent standard of workmanship is being used in the industry. A fee applies, and the Basic qualification is a pre-requisite.

Membership renewal

It helps the Guild a great deal if you renew your membership with a standing order by making a big difference to the cash flow at a critical time. We urge you to use it.
